Cynthia Wagner provided a brief update on the E-Waste Shred Event held this past weekend. She noted the total weight collected was not yet available. The event was well attended, with approximately 150 vehicles participating.

## **OTHER MATTERS BEFORE THE BOARD**

### **14. Public Comment**

Shauna Houghton, 113 Lakeland Drive, spoke to the Board on behalf of Smithville Lake Festival committee. She noted that we are about a month out from the event and wanted to make sure the public is aware of what is coming. This year, they are transforming downtown into a magical wonderland, and for the first time, Lakefest will feature a carnival. They are also adding a car cruise and car show to this year's lineup.

Shauna explained that to ensure neighbors are informed, door hangers will be placed on residences on East Meadows Street on the June 13, and committee members will be reaching out to businesses.

They will also be closing streets from Church Street to Main Street for the parade on June 20. Their goal is to make sure all residents and businesses are fully informed well in advance.

This year's theme is "Carnival," celebrating the exciting addition of their first-ever carnival at Lakefest. She noted that they are also introducing both a Grand Marshal and a Legacy Marshal this year.

Shuana noted that the definition of a Grand Marshal is someone who has been a consistent champion of the community, someone who makes it a better place to live. She added that this is a high honor, and this year they proudly recognize Matt Denton for his hard work and dedication.

Shauna gave a brief background on Matt. He began his service with the City in June 2017 as Recreation and Marketing Manager and was promoted to Parks and Recreation Director in March 2020. He has played a key role in the development of Heritage Park, Diamond Crest Park, Emerald Ridge Park, and the Main Street and OK Trails. Matt is also active in the Smithville Kiwanis Club and serves on the board of the Smithville Area Chamber of Commerce. Because of his dedication, impact, and commitment to this community, Matt has been selected as the Grand Marshal for the 2026 Smithville Lake Festival.

Brittany Johnston-Colle, 14612 Killarney Lane, noted that she, a constituent of Ward 3, respectfully requested that the Board revisit the fireworks policy enacted on November 1, 2022, specifically regarding White Iron Ridge.

She noted she felt that a wedding venue within city limits should not require fireworks. The displays are disruptive to neighborhood pets and children. She explained that during the last show, her four-year-old was woken and cried for the entire duration, which ended after 10:00 p.m. She said that it is too late for a residential neighborhood.

Ms. Johnston-Colle said that notification is also a problem. She had learned of a recent display through a neighbor's post on Smithville Uncensored, not through any official channel. She added that she had asked to be added to a notification list and never received a response.

Ms. Johnston-Colle added that given how few events they hold annually, she does not believe limiting or discontinuing fireworks would significantly affect their business, but the disruption to residents is real and ongoing.

She asked the Board to revisit the existing policy or decline to renew White Iron Ridge's annual permit.

**15. New Business from the Floor**

Alderman Hartman reported that representatives from Aristocrat Realty and Central Power Systems had contacted him regarding an upcoming project in Smithville. He stated that he met with the representatives earlier that day, however, no details of the development were discussed. The meeting was an introduction to the personnel involved and an overview of Central Power Systems' business model. Alderman Hartman shared this information to make the Board aware.

**16. Adjourn**

Alderman Hartman moved to adjourn. Alderman Kobylski seconded the motion.
