Construction season is in full swing here in Smithville! The 144th Lift Station Project is progressing and will begin moving west and north in the coming weeks. As this project expands, residents may notice impacts to traffic in the surrounding areas.



Our Streets Department crew will also be working in various parts of the city on concrete and asphalt repairs to keep our roads safe and in good condition. Work on the Commercial Avenue Sidewalk Project continues, with a completion anticipated in mid-September. Overlay of Commercial Avenue from 92 Highway to West Meadow Street will begin as sidewalk work is complete.

With so many active public and private projects, we want to remind everyone to stay alert in construction zones. Watch for signs, give workers plenty of space, and slow down when passing through work areas. Work zone safety is everyone's responsibility. Let's keep our crews safe and our city moving forward. Stormwater runoff is one of the biggest sources of water pollution, but you can be part of the solution. When it rains, water flows across rooftops, streets, and lawns, picking up everything in its path and carrying it to nearby streams and lakes.

You can help by picking up pet waste, using less fertilizer, and never dumping anything into a storm drain. Keep grass, leaves and trash out of the street, and consider installing a rain barrel or planting native landscaping to soak up excess water. Clean water starts in our neighborhoods, and small actions at home can make a big difference for the environment.

Keep Your Pets Safe in the Summer Heat

As temperatures rise, remember that pets are more sensitive to heat than humans. Help them stay safe and comfortable with these tips:

- Hydration is key: Always provide fresh, clean water to prevent dehydration.
- Never leave pets in cars: Even with windows cracked. temperatures can become deadly in minutes.
- Limit outdoor time: Walk or play in the early morning or late evening when it's cooler.
- **Provide real shade:** Dog houses can trap heat shaded, ventilated areas or indoors with AC are best.
- Watch their paws: Hot pavement can burn paw pads. If it's too hot for your hand, it's too hot for them.
- Know how they cool down: Dogs pant to regulate body temperature, which doesn't work well in humidity.

By taking these precautions, you can help ensure your pets stay healthy and happy all summer long.

NARCAN is now available at the City of Smithville Police Department at no cost.




