Message from Mayor Damien Boley

Dear Smithville Voters,

I believe it is the City's responsibility to ensure the safety and well-being of every individual in our community. We are proud of the Police Department's efforts to meet and exceed citizen expectations for service. Our police officers play a crucial role in maintaining peace, protecting our neighborhoods, responding to emergencies, and making our city a wonderful place to live, work, and raise families.



Currently the Police Department is facing challenges to meet the demands for service. These challenges include staffing, safety, recruitment, and retention of officers. On January 21, the Board of Aldermen voted to approve placing a ½ cent Public Safety Sales Tax on the April 8, 2025, ballot.

If approved, the sales tax will be paid by retail consumers who make purchases in our city regardless of whether they are city residents. If approved, the revenue generated from this sales tax will go directly for police services, such as officer compensation and benefits, necessary public safety equipment and staff to support community growth, and the implementation of a full-time animal control program.

Your voice matters in this decision, and I encourage you to engage in upcoming discussions and share your thoughts with others concerning this ballot measure. I hope you will take a moment to review this information so that you can make an informed decision at the polls on April 8, 2025.

WINTER STORMWATER TIPS

What you put on your driveway can impact our waterways. Excess salt and deicers often wash into storm drains, flowing into rivers and streams where they harm aquatic life and ecosystems. This winter, take simple steps to deice responsibly and protect the environment.

LESS SALT CAN BE BETTER

Most ice melt blends include recommended usage amounts on their packaging, which are often smaller than expected. In many cases, carefully spreading just one coffee mug's worth of salt is enough to effectively cover an entire driveway.






ACT BEFORE THE STORM

The golden rule is that it's usually easier to prevent ice than to remove it once it has settled. Before an expected storm, apply a thin layer of your chosen deicer proactively. After clearing snow, add more treatment as needed, following standard plowing or shoveling practices.

CONSIDER THE TEMPERATURE.

As temperatures drop, chlorides (e.g., salt) become less effective. If salt isn't working, avoid adding more; instead, consider using an alternative mixture or applying sand for better traction. To find the appropriate temperature range, check the instructions on the product label.
