Storm Water Master Plan

The City is gearing up to begin the Stormwater Master Planning process. This plan will take a significant amount of public input to ensure that the City accurately understands the current needs of Smithville, and to plan for future capacity. If you have any stormwater concerns, please report them on the City's Report-A-Concern feature on the website. Stay tuned for future updates and public information meetings.

Storm Water Summer Tips

- CONSERVE: Lawns need about one inch of rain a week, so only water your yard when necessary. Make sure to avoid watering in the middle of the day (which can lead to wasteful evaporation).
- WASH: When you wash your car in the driveway or road, the soap, wax, oil, and grease will ultimately wash into the City's storm drains.
- PLANT: Plant deep-rooted native plants that soak up rain runoff and provide food and a habitat for pollinators.
- MOW: Set your mower to keep grass at least 3 inches tall. This helps promote healthy root growth which slows the rate of runoff, absorbs more water, and suppresses weeds.
- CLEAR: Clear grass clippings and other yard waste from paved surfaces. Blow or sweep it off sidewalks, and never direct lawn mower discharge into the street.

Message from the Mayor

Warmer months mean increased construction activity. This spring, overlay projects have been completed on Hospital Drive and Tillman Road. This summer, the street division will be crack sealing and filling potholes as weather allows. The new playground near the Diamond Crest neighborhood was recently completed, additional features coming soon to that area include a parking lot, restroom, and shelter house. You may have also noticed work underway near the spillway and Smith's Fork Campground. The City is currently making enhancements to our water and wastewater utilities. A raw water pump station and wastewater lift station are currently under construction, with work anticipated to continue into the fall. Additional maintenance to our aging wastewater system will also begin this summer. We will be relining 3,300 feet of existing sewer main. The process is called Cured in Place Pipe which is a plastic liner that is inserted into the old main. The new line will provide additional strength, seals cracks and voids, and provides a smooth surface for wastewater flow.

You may have noticed crews from SAMS (Surveying and Mapping) around town over the last few months. This firm has been hired to assist with creation of a Geographic Information Systems (GIS) system for public and internal use. A GIS system will house information on infrastructure (Streets, Water, Sewer, and Storm Sewer) and is the first step towards asset management. A GIS system will also provide information that can be used for maintenance planning, capital improvement planning, assistance with development, budgeting, infrastructure condition, modeling and system analysis, traffic management, work order system, snow operations, and emergency services.

This summer you will also see the results of construction of another type: the City's website will be receiving some updates. The website refresh, which will roll out in July, will include more interactive content, easier navigation and an updated feel. Take a look at the updates at www.smithvillemo.org.

New Playground at Diamond Crest Park

The newest city playground recently opened at Diamond Crest Park. This playground features multiple slides, swings, a wheelchair accessible swing, and climbing features all on turf surfacing! The Parks and Recreation department is still working on adding additional amenities including a parking lot, restrooms, and a shelter house. The playground is located off 169 and W Hwy right next to the splash pad. The splash pad and playground are open to the public however the pool is a private HOA pool.

 means an increase in pedestrians (like kids) in neighborhoods and
 sidewalks. Make sure you are driving slow through neighborhoods
 and always taking time to look both ways thoroughly before
 proceeding through an intersection.
- Make sure that when doing yard work or other outdoor activities that you have plenty of water to stay hydrated and are dressed appropriately to avoid heatstroke.
- Have a plan for extreme weather with your family if you are out somewhere. You should have a designated meeting place if the weather turns.
