Stormwater Master Plan

The City is gearing up to begin the Stormwater Master Planning process. GBA consultants will be assisting the City in the development of the Stormwater Plan. The first phase of this project is public input. This plan will take a significant amount of public input to ensure that the City accurately understands the current needs of Smithville, and to plan for future capacity. If you have any stormwater concerns, please report them on the City's Report-A-Concern feature on the website. Stay tuned for future updates and public information meetings.

Fall Yard Care

It's that time of year again - fall is here and leaves are falling! We would like to remind you of the importance of preventing stormwater pollution while you make the most of the fall season.

Stormwater is formed when rainwater makes its way into storm drains or runs off into streams. On its journey to the stream, stormwater can pick up harmful substances that pollute the watershed. There are many sources of stormwater pollution unique to autumn, and we need your help to control them.

The leaves are falling, and their improper disposal poses a threat to the water resources. Leaf litter and any yard waste dumped into a stormwater basin or near a waterway can cause harmful nutrient accumulation. Leaves swept into the street can easily enter storm drains and make their way into the nearest creek. Dispose of leaf litter and yard waste in an appropriate manner, never in the street or stream! Yard waste can clog stormwater inlets and pipes, which can lead to flooding in the area. You can opt-in for Yard Waste services, which are included in your monthly trash/recycling bill.

Utility Rate Increase

In 2022, the City of Smithville completed a utility rate study which prescribes water and wastewater rate increases to fund utility system upgrades and improvements. The proposed rate increases (shown below) would be effective November 1, 2021 for residential and commercial accounts pending Board of Aldermen approval. A public hearing will be held at the October 18, 2022 Board of Aldermen Meeting at 7:00pm. Once approved, this increase will be reflected on the December 2022 utility bill.

Also, starting November 1, 2022, "snowbird" utility customers will also incur a \$50.00 charge to disconnect and reconnect utility service in the City, which is intended to recoup cost related to utilities staff performing shutoff and reconnection services.

Senior Rate Discount Update

During the Board of Aldermen strategic session in May 2022, Board members expressed interest in implementing a senior utility rate to provide billing relief to seniors on fixed incomes. Along with the senior trash charge implemented in 2021, a **senior rate for both the monthly water and wastewater fixed charge** has been proposed, which would be effective and available starting November 1, 2022 pending Board of Aldermen approval.

The proposed monthly fixed rate for water is \$11.77 per month and the proposed monthly fixed rate for wastewater is \$16.02 per month. This is the same amount as the current fixed charges for all utility customers, meaning **seniors would see no increase in their monthly fixed rates.**

In order to receive the discount, the utility bill must be in the name of the resident qualified for the senior rate. Residents must complete an agreement form and provide proof of age (65 years and older) to Utility Billing at City Hall to activate the discount.

Residents who are already signed up for the senior trash discount would automatically receive this fixed charge discount for both water and wastewater.
