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1. Call to Order

Hailey called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM. Parks and Recreation Committee members present were Jeremiah Bloemker, Hailey Kellerstrass, Alderman Shipley, Ben McClanahan, and Mayor Boley. Staff present were Matt Denton and Alex Threlkeld.

2. Approval of Minutes from the May 23, 2024, Parks and Recreation Committee Meeting

Mayor Boley made a motion to approve the minutes. Alderman Shipley seconded. Voice vote, all ayes.

3. Staff Report

Emerald Ridge Park Update:

As of August 16, we are still on schedule for early October to break ground. No specific date has been set, but they are not pushing the timeline back.

Heritage Park Band Stand:

Our City Insurance Company conducted their annual facilities tour back in June. During their visit, they identified the bandstand as a significant fall and tripping hazard. Due to the large drop-off on all sides with no railings, there is a high risk of someone walking off and injuring themselves. Additionally, the ramp leading up to the shelter has a gap between the pad and the ramp, suggesting it is no longer supported by the ground and could potentially collapse. The concrete at the edge of the pad is also deteriorating. They recommend taking this structure out of service and sectioning it off until it is either repaired or removed. Parks staff concur and suggest removing the structure, which was already slated for removal in future Heritage Park project plans. As of last week, the structure has been removed and maintenance staff is cleaning up the area.

Diamond Crest Park Update:

The City is in early discussions with a developer in the area of Diamond Crest Park. The development is going to provide a significant portion of in Lieu of Park Dedication fees. Staff are in conversation with the Development Department and developers about using the funds to complete the parking lot. More updates to come as conversations progress.

During June and July, Park staff were working with a local contractor for the Diamond Crest Park Restroom building pad. This contractor underwent a staffing change during the process. After meeting the new team member later in July, we received a quote that exceeded our budget. Our staff quickly coordinated with internal City departments to find another contractor. Information has been sent to a new contractor who is now familiar with the

project, and we are currently awaiting their quote to construct the restroom building pad. The restroom delivery was pushed to after Labor Day, as the park will not be as congested, and visitors will not be as affected by construction.

Subject:	Staff Update

Emerald Ridge Park Update:

As of January 14, 2025, Emerald Ridge Park is waiting on the shelter installation. The park and playground are usable, but no final walkthrough has been conducted. Once the shelter is installed and warmer weather is in the forecast, we will have a proper ribbon cutting and celebration.

Campground Road Resurfacing Project:

In the Fiscal Year 2025 budget, the BOA approved \$150,000 in funds for the resurfacing of Smith's Fork Campground Road. Due to heavy construction in the past two years, the road took on some significant damage. The resurfacing was completed before Thanksgiving and gravel is now being added to the sites to bring them level with the road.

Smith's Fork Campground had a great season, ending the year with a 42% occupancy rate. This is up from last year's occupancy rate of 39.48%.

Community Awards Banquet:

The Community Awards Banquet is scheduled for February 27, 2025, starting at 5:30 PM. The Parks and Recreation Legacy Fund, in collaboration with the City of Smithville, is partnering with the Smithville Area Chamber of Commerce to host an enchanting evening, "Night at the CMAs," at the White Iron Ridge. This gala dinner honors exceptional citizens and dedicated volunteers within our community while raising crucial funds for the Parks and Recreation Legacy Fund and Smithville Chamber of Commerce. Volunteers will be needed again this year. Staff need to know if you would like to volunteer and how many will attend.

Smithville Senior Center:

In preparation for the 2025 budget season, staff worked with Clay County Senior Services to secure \$13,950 (\$68,000 total) in additional grant funding for the Senior Services Coordinator, to extend our offerings to five meals a week, and to provide other alternative programs on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The Senior Center Board has decided not to renew the 501(c)(3) status. The financial management of the Senior Center is now overseen by City staff, and other daily responsibilities have been transferred to the Senior Services Coordinator. These changes were all approved by the Senior Center Board before the position was hired.

The Senior Center has evolved into a program managed by the Parks & Recreation Department. The Senior Center Board provides guidance on volunteers, operations, and activities they wish to see implemented. Staff recommended transitioning from a Cooperative Agreement to a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that clearly outlines the duties and responsibilities of both parties. The Board of Alderman approved the MOU on January 7, 2025.

4. Parks and Recreation Overview Presentation

Matt Denton, the Smithville Parks and Recreation Director, will provide an overview of the Parks and Recreation Department.

Smithville Parks & Recreation is committed to creating enriching experiences through parks, natural spaces, and leisure activities for the community. The department is responsible for overseeing nine city parks and a campground, which covers over 300 acres. In addition to managing park shelter houses, baseball fields, trails, restrooms, soccer fields, and football fields, the department also oversees the Smithville Senior Center, where various events are hosted, and Senior Fitness Classes are offered. Each year, the department serves around 6,615 participants through a variety of youth and adult sports leagues and programs.

Organizational Structure

The presentation includes an organizational chart detailing the structure of the Parks and Recreation department. The department is overseen by the Director. The Recreation Manager, Parks Maintenance Crew Leader, Senior Services Coordinator, and Camp Host all report directly to the Director. The Recreation Manager oversees the Recreation Coordinator. The Parks Maintenance Crew Leader oversees the two Park Maintenance Workers and various seasonal staff.

[Parks and Recreation Master Plan](#) (please read before meeting)

The City of Smithville's Parks and Recreation Master Plan outlines a ten-year vision for parks, recreation, open space, and trails, building on community visioning and the Comprehensive Plan work completed in 2019 and 2020. Smithville's population is expected to grow steadily, with projections indicating an annual increase of 2.2% to 3.3%, potentially adding 2,700 to 4,200 residents by 2030. This growth will bring greater diversity, with more active retirees and younger generations contributing to the community. Trails and recreational amenities are central to Smithville's appeal, enhancing the overall community value proposition. The implementation of the Master Plan will be supported by the recently passed 0.5% Parks and Stormwater Sales Tax.

Over 1,000 households participated in the community survey, which by any comparison is an outstanding level of community engagement. This was coupled with online discussion boards and community pop-up events.

Parks and Recreation Committee

The Parks and Recreation Committee is made up of 7 members and advises the Board of Aldermen on improvements and additions to the city's parks and recreation system. The committee also provides reports to the Planning Commission in line with the Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

Smithville Legacy Fund

Established in 2013, the Smithville Legacy Fund serves as a community foundation aimed at improving the quality of life in Smithville and surrounding areas. The Legacy Fund Advisory Board collaborates with stakeholders to prioritize expenditures from the fund. The board's goal is to close the funding gap for the Heritage Park Project covered in the Parks and Recreation Master Plan. The Board hosts an annual fundraising partnered with the Smithville Chamber of Commerce to raise funds.

Smithville Senior Center

The Smithville Senior Center is managed by the Smithville Parks and Recreation Department. It is largely funded by Clay County Senior Services. The Senior Center hosts lunch service every M-W-F from 9:00 AM- 2:00 PM. The Recreation Department hosts Fitness classes from 8:00 AM- 9:00 AM on M-W-F as well. After hours and days, it is open to the public to use for events and meetings.

In 2023, the Mayor established a Senior Services Focus Group, which met regularly throughout the year. The group determined that creating a position dedicated to enhancing the Senior Center as a central hub for senior service resources would be

beneficial. In August 2023, the Director applied for a grant with CCSS to fund this Senior Services position. By October, we were awarded a \$25,000 grant for the role, and by February 2024, the position was filled!

Special Events

Smithville Parks and Recreation hosts a few special events every year. The largest one is the Smithville Haunted Campground which is partnered with Larsons Cause. The Department also manages Community Special Events and Parades.

Facility Management

The Recreation Department manages 13 park facilities. All reservations are made online using our management software. The Facility Use Policy governs the use of public facilities under Section 105.030 of the Municipal Code. The purpose of this policy is to provide access fairly and reasonably to City facilities for the Smithville community. It is the goal of the City to balance the needs of users to reserve facilities for exclusive use, and the needs and expectations of residents so they will have access to City facilities for their use. The primary purpose of public parks is for the use and enjoyment of City residents. Uses that will substantially impair the rights of the public, in general, to use public facilities in favor of specific individuals or groups should not be permitted.

Youth and Adult Sports/Programs

The Parks Department became the Parks and Recreation Department in 2016 when the Board of Alderman asked the department to take on Youth Recreation Sports. The Recreation Manager position was then created and filled in 2017. The Recreation Division went from offering five sports programs to what it is today. The City now offers 11 youth and five adult recreation sports programs and 30+ youth and adult non-sport programs. The Recreation Coordinator was filled in 2022 to continue to grow the Recreation and leisure opportunities for the community while keeping the quality of service.

Park Maintenance

The Park Maintenance Division is made up of three full-time staff. Crew Leader and two Park Maintenance Workers. In peak season, March-August, seasonal staff are hired. The park's maintenance crews maintain the nine city parks, the campground, sports fields, and facilities.

Upcoming Developments

In Fiscal Year 2025, the Department is focusing on several projects. The construction of Emerald Ridge Park and Playground, The OK Railroad Trail is set to begin in early 2025, Resurfacing of Smith's Fork Campground and Parking lot at Diamond Crest Park. Additionally, the engineering and design work for the Smithville River Walk has already commenced.
